WHAT IS A BIRD CITY?

To receive this recognition from Audubon Minnesota, the City of Bemidji and local organizations demonstrated bird-friendly actions they are leading such as creating new habitat; promoting use of native plant species; erecting nest boxes, practicing conservation planning, reducing bird collisions with windows; hosting bird hikes and other events; offering youth nature activities; and promoting citizen science monitoring and research.
